G'day shooters! Here at 3GT we are excited to present to you our first scope review from the first few NRL22 matches which were held in Brisbane recently. We take pride in our sport and love to encourage as many people as possible to participate in these matches.

Make no mistake, if you are new to the sport, it can be overwhelming where to start. Before you drop your hard-earned cash into any equipment, research is vital as many existing competitors will tell you. The aim of this review is to provide upfront commentary and ratings for scopes that were used in recent competitions to help you decide arguably the most vital piece of equipment you will ever buy for your rifle setup – the scope.

Six scopes are reviewed with the basic specifications that you need to know, and six key attributes which we feel are the most important to a competitive shooter:

- 1. Athlon Cronus BTR 4.5-29 x 56;
- 2. Kahles K 525 I 5-25 x 56;
- 3. Element Optics Helix 6-24 x 50;
- 4. Vortex Viper PST 4-16 x 50 (discontinued);
- 5. Burris 4.5-14 x 42 Fullfield E1; and
- 6. Vortex Viper PST Gen II 5-25 x 50.

- 3) What reticle? APRS1 FFP IR MIL, glass etched, Christmas tree-style

- **10) User comment:** Rugged and well made. Clear images throughout magnification range. Tactile adjustments with confident, audible clicks. Has a zero stop, waterproof, fog proof, shock proof and argon purged. Appears to be a quality, well made scope which is comparable to high end manufacturers like Swarovski with the features available on this price range. You can shoot into space with this much elevation.

## 2. Kahles K 525 I 5-25 x 56

- **10) User comment:** Crystal clear images as expected from a subsidiary company of Swarovski. Confidence-inspiring clicks when turning the knobs, holds zero even when mounted on different rifles (assuming you have quality scope rings and mounts). Has a zero stop and a 10 year warranty. Excellent elevation to maximise the use of your cartridge.

- **9) RRP?** \$769.00
- **10) User comment:** Fairly compact, lightweight design that has some top-end scope manufacturer features including zero stops, removable throw lever and tactile knob adjustments. Waterproof, fogproof, shockproof and nitrogen purged. While on the lower end of the price range, it is ideal on a budget or if you are starting out in precision rifle competitions and intend to upgrade later.

# 4. Vortex Viper PST 4-16 x 50 (discontinued)

- 6) Click values? 1/4 MOA per click, 75 MOA maximum elevation, 75 MOA maximum windage

- 9) RRP? Approximately \$900.00
- **10) User comment:** This scope is well over eight years old, making it older than most of the scopes in this review, however it still holds its own in precision shooting. It tracks well and while it has no zero stops, it has shims to customise the adjustment range to your liking. It features an easy to understand reticle for fast target acquisition. It also has an ample amount of windage and elevation adjustment for most long-range shooting applications. This scope is discontinued in favour of Gen 2 models, you can still find it on Ebay and Amazon. Vortex's lifetime warranty is one of the best on the market.





## 5. Burris 4.5-14 x 42 Fullfield E1

- **10) User comment:** Ideal for shooting from the bench, can't ask for anything better. It is not the best for practical rifle shooting as magnification can be lacking at certain distances. However, it can hold 0.6 MOA at 50mm with factory ammo (.22LR) making it more than suitable for other applications such as hunting.
